Wheeling Barbers Give Free Trims In Memory Of Teen

WHEELING – Local hair stylists offered their time and supplies and provided free haircuts Monday in memory of a Wheeling youth who died tragically.

About 50 people were scheduled to turn out for the trims, which took place throughout the afternoon Monday at the Youth Services System offices at the Hazel Atlas Building in East Wheeling.

The haircuts were a public service program organized by Americorps-VISTA volunteer Shelby Fluharty for YSS.

She was inspired by the story of Caleb Smail, a 19-year-old who was murdered in January 2019 during a robbery. Monday would have been Smail's 22nd birthday. "My initial thought was to do a free heircutting for the communication."
