YSS RESIDENTIAL SERVICES

Since 1974, YSS has maintained the northern panhandle's only emergency youth shelters—Samaritan House and Helinski Shelter. Starting in 1986, YSS has operated the Northern Regional Juvenile Center, now the Ronald C. Mulholland Juvenile Center as the state's only private nonprofit juvenile facility. Since last year, this center has been serving young women who are committed to state correctional care.

In FY2014, our emergency shelters welcomed **130** youth. The Ronald C. Mulholland Juvenile Center had **150** youth in total.

Our Youth Achievement Center works with young men 12-17 with an intellectual delay or disability and co-existing behavior issues. This long-term residential center served 10 youth.

Where do these young men and women go when they leave our care?

A third of them (34% go home, to a relative's home. A significant number of these youth(34%) move to more specialized treatment to meet their needs including psychiatric inpatient care.

13% go to detention centers other than our own Mulholland Center, some to adult


corrections.

6% move on to pursue independent living into and graduating from our Transitional Living Program. **4.5%** go to foster care homes or to other safe destinations.

8.5% remained in our care as our FY2014 ended on June 30, 2014.

We want children to be in safe homes, or to receive much needed treatment and care. The chart below illustrates these residential outcomes.

68% of youth in our residential programs return home or they receive needed specialized treatment upon discharge from our care.



COMMUNITY SERVICES—REACHING OUT TO

Families in crisis are helped through YSS community services. These services are designed to give parents skills, support their best efforts and enable families to stay together or to be reunited if the children have been placed out of their care.

32 families participated in parent education and support in FY2014,

19 of them reported success. 7

year's end. Other families lost custody of their children.
Supervised Visitation served 28 families. 12 kept custody of their children or regained it 10 families are still being served.

22 families worked with our Adult Living Skills program.

12 reached their plan goals, with 3 still participating. In-Home Safety Services worked with 14 families, 7 were successful in reducing the risk to their children.

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MOVING FORWARD TO ADULTHOOD

Each year, between 200 and 300 youth in West Virginia's child welfare system turn 18 and leave their care. Youth Services System has worked with these youth who are approaching adulthood offering housing, support, and services to these young men and women for 31 years.

In FY2014, 31 youth created a plan for their independence in our Transitional Living Program. 23 of them entered post-secondary education or training programs. 4 received their GEDs. 39 youth (including those in the program on July 1, 2013) were employed.

This is a critical time of life when every young person is setting the foundation stones for their future. YSS believes that our work makes a valuable difference in their lives.

Without this care, studies show that former foster care youth face giant hurdles:

They are poor, with many of them unemployed,. At age 24, their income is half that of everyone else of their age. They report being homeless since they left foster care.

They are more likely to be parents, more likely to have been in the criminal justice system as victims and violators.

Transitional Living works to give youth a solid start.

PROFESSIONAL SERVICES FOR CHANGE

Youth, or families in crisis benefit from the services that YSS professionals offer. In FY2014, our professional staff treated 54 youth in our Intensive Outpatient Program for alcohol and drug abuse. 78 youth experienced our outpatient services including therapy.

Our Central Referral, Intake,

and Services Program staffed by licensed social workers fielded 1040 referrals, calls, and questions.

Our case managers worked with 181 youth and their families. Their work led in many instances to better relationships within families, new sources of support for a youth and their parents, and an end

to the crisis which had existed. Bridges, our schoolbased counselors, served 300 youth in Marshall County schools and Wheel-

ing Park High School.



WORK AND TRAINING

Youth Services System's offers employment training, life skills training, and work experiences for young people in the northern panhandle.

The **Life Skills** training gives young people insight into what they need to know to be fully functioning adults in the our communities. This includes skills at living independently, at seeking jobs, and keeping jobs. 211 youth participated in this program

during FY2014

The Northern Panhandle Workforce Investment Board (NPWIB) makes our **Youth In Action** possible. 140 youth participated in this program last year. 104 of them found work. 18 graduated from high school, or received GEDs or training certificates. Two completed programs at Belmont College and West Virginia Northern Community College. Another finished LPN

training. All 140 completed their Test for Adult Basic Education successfully.

BEFORE & AFTER SCHOOL CARE

YSS works with Elm Grove Elementary School to offer Before and After School programs for those attending. Last year, 123 children took part in this program that enriches their learning in Ohio County.

Starting last year, McNinch Elementary School in Moundsville began an After School, funded in part by Noble Energy. This program is offered to McNinch students and those at Central Elementary
School in Moundsville. This program had 20 students taking part.

NIP Tax Credits

During this past year, Youth Services System received \$35,000 in Neighborhood Investment Program (NIP) tax credits from the West Virginia Department of Development.

Donors who gave \$500 or more to Youth Services System who paid WV personal income taxes, WV Corporate Net Income Tax or WV Business Franchise Tax had their taxes reduced through the use of these credits.

For this current fiscal year, we have received \$50,000 in NIP tax credits.
